From Precinct 1 position, Chody considers higher office

Precinct I Constable Robert Chody is considering running for a higher office in 2016 and has the financial wherewithal to fund such a bid.

Mr. Chody said Friday he is not ready to announce which position he might seek.

He has a stockpile of cash ready, having loaned his campaign \$125,000 over the past six months — \$25,000 December 30 and \$100,000 June 10, campaign finance reports show.

"I am highly exploring some other areas of interest, though I am not a candidate for any other office at this time," said Mr. Chody, who was first elected in 2008 as constable of Precinct 1.

Mr. Chody began his law enforcement career with the Austin Police Department in 1996 and also has four years of Army experience.

He served as a deputy constable in Precinct 2 before taking office in 2009.

Constables are licensed

peace officers charged with executing court orders such as criminal arrest warrants, protective orders and evictions for county and state courts

In addition to fulfilling those obligations, Mr. Chody said his office has taken extra measures to reach out to the community such as partnering with other law enforcement agencies to better serve victims of domestic abuse and to address drunk driving.

Mr. Chody and his wife Beverly won the lottery in March 2001 and received a \$51 million payment.

Precinct 1 covers portions of Round Rock and northwest Austin as well as a snippet within the city limits of Cedar Park that includes the Brushy Creek Regional Trail and Champion Park but no homes.

The Precinct 1 commissioner's seat will be up for grabs in 2016 because officeholder Lisa Birkman is not seeking a fourth term in office She announced the decision to Republican leaders in April.

Round Rock banker and businessman Landy Warren, a Republican, announced in mid-June he will seek the position.

Mr. Warren indicated May 28 he will serve as his own campaign treasurer By June 30, he had brought in \$37,850 in political contributions.

Among his supporters are a number of influential Williamson County business people including philanthropist and real estate developer Jack Garey of Georgetown, land developer John Avery Jr., Dr. Nelson Avery and Round Rock City Councilman Will Peckham.

Mr. Warren represents WilCo on the Lone Star Regional Water Authority, currently serving as board president.

Sheriff James Wilson is also up for re-election in 2016 and has already drawn one opponent for the March 1 Republican primary: Bill Kelberlau, a Vietnam veteran with both military and civilian management experience.

Deputy constables pool money to spend on 2016 elections

A non-partisan political action committee formed last week aims to give peace officers more say in 2016 elections.

T.W. Evans of Liberty Hill, a deputy constable in Precinct 4, filed paperwork July 15 to form the Peace Officers of Williamson County PAC

"It is a way for peace officers that are not members of police organizations to have a voice in community politics," Mr. Evans said Thursday

"It is a way to show unity."

Mr. Evans serves as campaign treasurer for the fledgling committee, which is recruiting members who are current or retired peace officers living within the county

"As long as they are a Texas peace officer they are welcome to come on in," said Mr Evans, who served as a peace officer in Travis County for several years before being hired by Williamson County


The group plans to endorse candidates in the 2016 races for sheriff and precinct constables. All four WIICo constable positions are up for election.

Questionnaires will be sent to each candidate and then the PAC membership will decide by a two-thirds vote which candidates to endorse and support financially. Mr. Evans sald. "Deputy constables generally do not have associations that we can belong to. This is another reason we are starting this up, so the deputy constables can have a voice as well," Mr. Evans said.

Each precinct's constable can appoint a staff of roughly eight to 10 deputies who must go through a hiring process similar to what police departments use to hire officers.

Mr. Evans and a fellow peace officer; whom he declined to identify came up with the idea of forming the PAC just a couple of weeks ago.

They plan to soon launch a Facebook page and social media accounts.
